On Wednesdays, I meet with the girls who are in the SCJJC. Every Wednesday before going to the JJC, I stop and visit my friend Carol at her new home in Valley View Nursing Home. She is a retired middle school teacher and a former volunteer with the girls at the JJC.

Carol and I often discuss the challenges with the JJC girls and how gifted they are yet how troubled and lost. Our conversations have recently focused on one specific student, Abbie.

Abbie is a gifted poetry writer who appears to have much common sense. Abbie is 17 years old and has been in and out of the JJC four times. We have developed a special relationship, and she accepted Christ as her personal Savior July 31, 2023. Abbie spent Christmas and New Year's <u>alone</u> in the JJC girls pod designed to house 12 teens. Abbie is a perfect example of Romans 7:14-25.

I have shared Abbie's poetry with Carol as we discuss Abbie's issues. Upon leaving one day, Carol said, "Barb, tell Abbie I will be praying for her."

When I met Abbie, we discussed Carol and her situation in the nursing home. I told Abbie that Carol would be praying for her. Abbie then asked, "Barb, will you take me to meet Carol when I get out, I would like to thank her."

Abbie was released on a Monday. On Wednesday my scheduled day to visit Carol, I received a call from Abbie asking to go visit Carol that afternoon. Abbie's step-dad agreed to bring her to Valley View. We met in the parking lot. Abbie and I then walked thru the nursing home halls to meet and surprise Carol. Surprise it was! I had the honor of introducing my praying friend, Carol, to Abbie. There were hugs and tears. Carol then handed a folded note to Abbie saying "This is my prayer for you — I was going to send it with Barb, but instead I can give it to you today." AND that she did! Truly God's Plan.

As of this date Abbie and I have connected. She is doing well as she still struggles with the up and downs of life. This time she is not alone – God is with her. She wrote a poem for Carol, expressing her heartfelt thanks for Carol's prayers. It is printed on the back page.
